'Widdup' comes from a ms book of over 200 pages, probably compiled by John Sugden, born in 1861, whose father, Whittaker, farmed at Salterforth between 1862 and 1879. Set out in portrait form, it is likely Sugden was an organist. Despite the name, the tune is not one of those in the HTI attributed to Accepted Widdop of Halifax (1750-1801).
