The only citation for the tune in the Hymn Tune Index is from A Selection of Hymn Tunes for the use of the Sunday School in Elm Street, Manchester, 1820. There is no text set to the tune, but since it is entitled 'Sacrifice' it is possible to assume the tune might have been sung to the Wesley words. The ms attributes the tune to 'E. Taylor', but it does not appear in the canon of compositions by Edward Taylor of Norwich (1784-1863). HTI 16908.
